Grant Funds Mental Health Programs in the Classroom

A Priority for the Health of Our Children and Our Community

We're raising awareness about mental health problems in our communities, thanks to a \$200,000 grant from Kohl's. The two-year partnership funds Stress Happens: You Got This! and Healthy Boundaries. Both programs are designed to reach fourth and fifth grade students in the South Bend Community School system.



Mental health topped our Community Health Needs Assessment 2016-2018. It's a critical issue that affects the health and wellness

of all our communities. That's why our Community Health Enhancement Department at Memorial Hospital developed initiatives to build awareness about mental health at an earlier age. The Kohl's Cares grant allows us to deliver a series of programs into the classroom that address mental health across the age spectrum.

We developed StressHappens.org, an online resource for parents and caregivers, teachers and students. Newsletters, guides and learning programs available on the website already are making a difference in how our community approaches mental health issues.

Team Approach to Pediatric Trauma Care

Collaboration Improves Access to LIfe-Saving Care for Seriously Injured Children

Local giving has allowed Beacon Children's Hospital to take important steps toward verification as a pediatric trauma center. Our trauma and pediatric intensive care teams have access to training and educational programs through Cincinnati Children's Hospital. The multi-year partnership is helping us improve how we deliver care to seriously injured children who arrive at our hospital.

The training helped change lives last fall when three critically injured children arrived at our hospital by MedFlight. Trauma, intensive care and specialized critical care teams worked side by side to assess and stabilize the patients. The high-level communication and seamless coordination of care ensured three young patients received the right care at the right moment.

U-Turn for Youth Initiative

Turning the Trajectory of Mental Health in a Positive Direction



Generous donor support has helped Beacon develop an initiative to address increasing rates of youth suicide. Called U-Turn for Youth, the

program is designed to improve mental health for youth and adults in our community for years to come.

Indiana has the country's highest rate of youth who contemplate suicide. The state ranks second highest for youth suicide attempts.

A gift from the estate of Norma Frank has helped U-Turn for Youth develop education, training and motivation programs aimed at our community's youth. The programs work to:

- Reduce the stigma surrounding mental health and suicide
- Increase coping skills and resiliency of local youth and young adults
- Empower parents, guardians and youth professionals to cultivate protective factors and nurture coping skills and resiliency in their children
- Inform the community about best practices for accessing the mental health system

During its first year, U-Turn for Youth introduced its programs to school

personnel and students in South Bend's 10 intermediate schools (grades 5-8) and three high schools. Beacon associates also have received suicide prevention training as part of the program.

An Eye on Newborns

Technology Helps Parents Check In By Live-Stream Video

A small camera makes a big difference for parents whose infant is in the Newborn Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at Beacon Children's Hospital. They can watch over their newborns from anywhere at any time, thanks to a specially designed camera system called Angel Eye.

Angel Eye provides live-stream video from the baby's bedside. Parents simply log into a secure account on their laptop or phone to check in with their infant.

Beacon Health Foundation received funds from a generous donor to purchase five Angel Eyes for the NICU in 2017. Today, all the Angel Eyes are constantly looking in on the hospital's tiniest patients.

THE GIFT OF TECHNOLOGY

Amy and Jared Slav used the technology to watch over their son Dominic, who was born at 31 weeks. The livestreaming video gave them peace of mind and a virtual presence with Dominic during his stay in the NICU.

The Slavs shared their Angel Eye with another mother who was separated from her newborn immediately after delivery. Now that Dominic is at home, his family hopes other parents will have the opportunity to be with their newborn 24/7, literally and virtually.

Elkhart General Becoming a Level III Trauma Center



Elkhart General Hospital now accepts and treats patients with traumatic injuries. It is the only Level III "in proces uma center in Elkhart County

Elkhart General Hospital has taken an important step forward in providing trauma care for the community. The hospital received approval in March 2018 from the Indiana EMS Commission

as a Level III "in process" trauma center. Not only does that mean we're now able to accept and treat some of our community's most seriously injured patients, but it also signifies that our pathway to becoming a verified Level III trauma center has begun.
