A Personal Journal Gives Answers Jim Hahn Memorial Gifts Support Nursing Education

A notebook, an inner conviction, and the support of a community.

In the fresh moments of grief, it's hard to think clearly about how best to carry on a legacy.

In March of 2021, following treatment for colon cancer the year before, Jim Hahn returned to Elkhart General Hospital (EGH) with COVID-induced pneumonia. For more than a month, Jim's wife, Cindy, and their family sat outside Jim's isolation room.

There, with the support of Jim's nurses, Cindy would unpack her emotions, fears and confusion. These nurses were like family. Cindy leaned on all of them, especially Ashley, affectionately referred to as "Awesome Ashley," who was on duty the day Jim passed.

Soon after Jim passed, Cindy found a notebook Jim kept which included names and reminders about the people who surrounded him with care every day at EGH.

By early 2022, Cindy knew how best to carry on Jim's legacy.

A new Nursing Education Endowment at EGH had the right fit. Its structure removed barriers, like career stigmas and tuition costs, with an added benefit—a 1:1 match, made possible by two local anonymous families.

"We are so grateful for the support of families like the Hahn's who recognize how critically important our nurses are to the care of the whole family," said Susan King, Foundation President.

Sam Grewe Shares His Story Connecting the Dots



Being able to receive chemotherapy and other treatments close to home at Beacon Children's Hospital, rather than having to drive to Riley Children's Hospital was "huge for me and family."

Sam Grewe isn't glad he developed cancer. Even today, he struggles with how to phrase his feelings about it. "I think it boils down to my belief that I am a better person today —stronger, more mature, with a better perspective on life and more driven—because of the hardships I've overcome," said Sam.

Sam was diagnosed with osteosarcoma, an aggressive, highly malignant bone cancer at the age of 13. With only two options to remove the tumor, Sam's parents ultimately agreed to let Sam make the final decision. Not ready to give up his love of athletics, Sam chose a rare partial amputation called rotationplasty, which would allow him to continue to compete in sports.

Since finishing his treatment, Sam has gone on to become an international inspirational figure. In 2016, he competed for Team USA in the Paralympics in Rio de Janeiro, taking a silver medal, and in 2020 winning gold at the Paralympics in Tokyo.

In Tokyo, shortly after he arrived at the track to compete, he was handed a letter from a local Japanese man, Masaki Kando. The man wrote that his 13-year-old son, Haruki, had the same rotationplasty performed after developing the same type of cancer. "Even though I knew the details of the rotationplasty surgery, I was very anxious," the man wrote. "Meanwhile we found about you. You gave us great courage to my family. My son is watching on TV today. We are all supporting you."

Sam later shared the letter on Twitter, tweeting, "Win or lose, this is what it's all about. This makes it all worth."

The 23-year-old Middlebury native is now in his first year of medical school at the University of Michigan. He credits the care he received at Beacon for his inspiration to study medicine. Specifically mentioned, Dr. Colleen Morrison, a Pediatric Hematologist/Oncologist at Beacon Children's Hospital who Sam has kept in touch with for years. "She's played a big role in my pursuit of a career in medicine," he said.

Project HOPE Awarded \$1 Million Grant to Fight Substance Abuse

Marshall County Based Partners Consortium led by Beacon's Community Impact Team

It takes a village to raise our children and a community to build a safety net of support services to protect and heal families from substance abuse.

In August 2020, Beacon Health System was awarded a 3-year, \$1 million grant by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to assemble and support a collaborative coalition within Marshall County to address opioid and substance abuse, which resulted in Project HOPE.

Project HOPE partners will use their collective strength in the prevention, treatment and recovery services for those impacted by opioid and substance abuse.

"We value and need the wisdom and experience of multiple individuals and organizations to provide the best possible outcomes for Marshall County residents and families," says Project HOPE Director Donn Yoder.

Slated services include monthly education sessions for families, caregivers, children and the public, along with providing an evidence-based prevention strategy in county schools.

Project HOPE will also focus on an integrated treatment and recovery system across the county and easier access to services with two new navigator positions. Additional emphasis will also be placed on supporting employers hiring individuals in recovery.

Accidents happen. At any time. To any one of us. In fact, traumarelated accidents are the leading cause of death for people under age 45 in the U.S.


Tiffany Brantley's trauma surgeons knew she was a fighter when she came through an 11- hour surgery to stabilize her shattered body.

What should have been a standard morning jog turned into a terrifying accident. The 30-year-old had survived extensive injuries after a drunk driver veered his car into her during her morning run.

Her care team worked together seamlessly as Tiffany moved from ICU, through multiple surgeries, into rehabilitation and physical, speech and occupational therapy. "They gave me the care and place I needed to rest and recover," said Tiffany.

Falls and vehicle accidents cause 74% of traumatic injuries annually

- **2,500 trauma victims** are transported to Beacon each year.
- 15% are children.
- Each year in Indiana, there are **5,000** trauma-related **deaths.**
- Preventable death rates **drop to 2%** for patients treated at a Trauma Center.
- Beacon supports the only regional trauma centers for a 22-county area.



Beacon's MedFlight, the only local air transport service, provides rapid transport for critically ill or injured patients. Patients are **16% more likely to survive** than those brought to us by ground ambulance.
